




Judson Jottings

Judson, May 24, 1889 I spent the 18, 19 and 20inst. At and in the vicinity of Cold Springs. Crops are promising and business good. 18th Rev, J. A. Ammons, pastor of the church, preached an able and eloquent sermon. After services the church, in conference with Rev. Jno. Earls in the chair excluded one member from fellowship, and brought charges against two others. The church appeared in good working order.

The congregation was unusually large for Saturday. They are to be lauded in the choice of brothers. S. B. Gibson, W. H. Davis and L. frisby as deacons.

19th at 9;30 a.m. a large crowd assembled on the bank of Alarka creek near the church to witness the Baptism of George DeHart, which was performed by Rev. J. A. Ammons. A fine shower of rain fell Rev. J. S. Smiley spoke in behalf of the Baptist Orphanage of Thomasville. A collection amounting to \$5.02 was taken up for its benefit. Rev. R. Rickman and J. A. Ammons preached and the sacrament was administered. I shared the hospitality of a number of those good people especially of Rev. J. P. Panther and Sam B. Gibson. It gave me great pleasure to meet L. J. Welch of Cherokee and Rev.

Wayside May 20, 1889—Editor Swain County Herald.

Dear Sir. Hoping that a sketch from this section will be acceptable to you and that it might interest your readers I venture up on the tast.

Rickman of Macon County.

I moved to this Country about 20 years ago and remained here for about 9 years and moved away. This spring I came back. I remember very well when I first came to this Country of seeing men going out to the mountains deer driving, some 8 or 10 in a gang with 15 or 20 hounds and seeing them return sometimes on Sunday packed with venison and bear meat. At that time there was but one little log church within 4 miles of us. We had preaching in it once a month by an old brother by the name of James. He would walk in on Saturday lay down his gun and shot pouch, take out his bible and preach to us. After service he would take up his gun and go home with some of us.

On Sunday he preached again. Some of the members would give him a bushel of corn. He would have it ground lay it on a hand cart throw his gun across it and pull out for home some 10 miles away.

Cursing, swearing, drinking whiskey and cock fighting were the order of the day. Things have changed materially since then. I now find 3 churches within 2 miles of each other and pastors preaching at each of them. I have been here about 3 months and have not heard half a dozen oaths, have seen no one going deer driving, have seen no cock fighting but have been to preaching or Sunday school every Sabbath. Almost everybody takes as much interest in preaching and Sabbath school work as they used to take in deer driving, cock fighting and drinking. I must say that I never saw a more industrious and pious settlement in my life. A mighty reformation has taken place. The woods they used to kill the deer and bear in, are now full of ox teams taking out the finest of timber for market.

My brother A. V. Calhoun has been merchandising here about five years. He tells me he has not lost so much as fifty dollars by crediting the people thus showing that they are nearly all honest men.

This is a great change, but not withstanding it all. I can see some mistakes they have made, someof them of a very grave character. Among them are the building of too many churches too close together and dividing up the school districts too small. I suppose this grew out of some sectional feeling of a selfish nature regardless of the common good of the community, and the interests of the youth of the country. When these things are remedied no better section can be found in so remote a country as this.

I will give one instance as it directly concerns me. The district formerly known as district no. – is now divided in to two new ones known as district no's—and taught at Tennessee river meeting house and Fairview meeting house, thus making a school at each of them of about 2 ½ months if they were consolidated and taught together at Double Branch Church the furtherest would not have to go more than 2 or 2 ½ miles, and we could have school of 5 months and may be longer and a much better building to use. I earnestly hope that the people of this section will see their mistake and correct it.

Will you kindly aid us through the press to show the people their mistake and thus bring about a consolidation of the districts. will write you again soon. J. P. Calhoun

Letter from Bill Hamilton

Welch May 17, 1889 Editor Herald, Dear sir. This morning the clouds are hanging low and heavy, and I think plenty of rain will be the result, which is needed very badly. Our farmers are alive to their business and seems to be looking forward to a good time. All other business is gradually moving up to what it ought to be, to make prosperity in the

county. J. M. Clement Jr. of Judson was here last week. He speaks highly of our village and country, and thinks of locating here soon. If so he will engage in the newspaper business with W. H. Crisp.

Rev. L. M. Medlin agent for Hill Bros. & Co. of Bryson City is stiring up the people on the subject of staves, some of our citizens have gone to work, success I hope. everybody ought to take the Herald.

Letter from Graham County

Welch, N. C. May 27, 1889 We had a fine shower last night. Farmers look hopeful, crops look fine. Rev. T. J. Calhoun preached to a large and attentive congregation yesterday at the Baptist Church. N. M. Pilkington's wife has been quite ill for a few days but is improving.

Rev. L. M. Medlin has several parties employed getting out staves. He is working in the interest of Hill Bros. & Co. of Bryson City. Now if the R. R. Co. will give us a Depot and sidetract at Judson we be all right. I think it would be greatly to the interest of the R. R. Co. as well as to our people to do so. There would be a great deal of freight shipped to and from that point. At least eight of our merchants would be supplied there. I am pleased to learn that the County Board of Swain County has had a public road laid out to Judson. Now if they will discontinue the road from L. D. Morgan's to the ford of Nantahala, and put all the hands on the new road they will soon complete it as there will be at least half enough labor donated by Graham citizens to complete the road. The road to Nantahala is very dangerous one as it is along side R. R. for about 2 miles and no chance to remedy it. I am pleased to note that Welch is looking up. It is pleasantly located and I predick a bright future for her citizens.

I learn that W. H. Crisp will soon renew the publication of the Western Advance. We are trying to swell the number of subscribers at this place for the Herald with best wishes for your success, I close Graham.

J. J. Wolfe age 18 to Nancy Hill age 16 both of Cherokee applied for marriage license The above parties were married on the 24 inst. by Rev. Saute Owl at his residence in Yellow Hill.

June 6, 1889 Local News

Come in next week and list your taxes, and look out for the Board of Health this week.

County Commissioners proceeding will be printed next week.

The Marietta and North Georgia road will be standard gauge hereafter.

J. R. Edwards brought in some more fine specimens of Corundum Monday.

A lot of negro laborers were on the train Tuesday bound for the Knoxville Southern.

The band boys are making splendid progress already. Hurrah, for Bryson City band.

D. K. Collins tells us that crops were looking much sorrier in the vicinity of Knoxville

than here.

One of H. J. Elmore's double rigs went to Robbinsville Monday to take a load of court attendants.

Aunt Mel, says it was worth \$10,000.00 to her when she struck Centralia, Washington Ter. She is staying there.

J. B. Raby has made needed improvements to the building occupied by him, among them a platform in front of it.

The rain of Thursday last was a grand good thing. It was the first thorough soaking we have had in some weeks and was badly needed.

A half pound black bass occasioned considerable amusement for a number of boys who had him in the ditch on the square Tuesday.

A terrible flood at Johnstown Pa. last Friday swept ten or twelve thousand people to untimely graves. A big reservoir broke owing to heavy rains.

The eastern bound train Friday morning was nearly three hours late, caused by a fall of rock in Indian tunnel. No damage except detention of the train.

Somebody carried our umbrella home with them from the preaching last Wednesday night. We know it was a mistake but would suggest an examination of handles. Ours has the letters H.A.H. cut in the handle. We want it.

W. F. Burns has taken a large barge down the river. He will use it for ferrying rock across the stream from the fine granite quarry three miles below. The stone will be dressed for caps and sills in the Collins Block. The quarry opened above town had two many seams in it.

The Macon County hanging will not come off. McMahan's sentence has been commuted to imprisonment for life.

Now that summer is upon us it is well for everyone to be prepared for the inevitable. Children will eat green fruit and must take the consequences. Capt. McBee's private car "Daisy" went to the end of the road Thursday, and back on Friday. Capt. McBee and family, the superintendent of the convicts and his family, and T. McNeely were on board. Capt. McBee promised us some improvements soon, among them the change of name of the station regulation of rates to Epp's Spring and building a

side track at the same place. Regarding the completion of the road he had nothing important to say. Of course it will be completed and probably a connection made with Chattanooga. That is about all there is to say.

Whittier June 6, 1889

Mr. Editor, Dear sir—By request the Rev. Thomas Brown of Asheville will be at Whittier this week to organize a division of the sons of Temperance. I think he will go down to Bryson City and do the same if requested so to do, Yours truly, M. Zachary.

My second visit to the village of Welch was one of much pleasure and interest. I am glad to note the steady increase of its business efforts, which, if judiciously put forth, will, in time make it one among the many flourishing towns of Western North Carolina. Can Welch become a town? is a everyday question. If labor, perseverance, energy and zeal can make a town, Welch will be one. It has the location, the purity of air and water, the mountain scenery, the productive soil, the natural advantages, the enterprising inhabitants, and, in fact, everthing that is essential to the building of a town. She will have an advertising medium through which she will make her advantages known.

C. C. Bryson does a good mercantile business.

The pond of stagnant water just south of the Post Office door, should at once be drained as it is injurious to health and is a public nuisance.

June 13, Local News

A. M. Edwards says somebody took his umbrelia from the court room Tuesday. It has a straight handle light colored and the tip is covered with leather. The mistake can be corrected by leaving it at this office

Capt. B.B. Lake is talking of building on his lot by the railroad this summer. Your Editor will also erect a rooftree to shelter his family. The Baptist church will soon be underway. Altogether the building outlook is good.

Hill Bros. & Co. are receiving some very fine white oak staves. We hope our people will take hold of the business and learn how to make some money out of it. we have got more white oak than any other kind of timber.

The train yesterday morning had an accident about five miles this side of Bushnell. The track spread owing to the soft condition of the road bed, and two boxes were turned over. Fortunately no one was injured. The train was delayed till afternoon.

We don't like to be so set up and then let down again as we were last Saturday when our old friend James Collins began to talk new potatoes, and wound up by saying he had not brought them with him. Potatoes are potatoes and our barrel is about empty.

In the kiln of brick recently burned by Mr. Miller were half a dozen with the impress of a baby's foot in them and the date marked with a sharpened stick. They came out in good condition and baby's foot steps in the sanded brick, are preserved for her to look at when she shall be a matron with little ones of her own clustering at her knee.

"All aboard for Epp's spring" was the cry last Thursday a little before noon. The log train with several flats and box cars was boarded by 30 or 40 men and boys, and by night all the lumber for the Baptist church had been loaded and hauled to Bryson City. Friday morning it was thrown from the cars, and work on the building will soon begin.

In the progress of repairs to Gen. Hampton's mill, an important and valuable discovery has been made in uncovering a bold spring of water, strongly impregnated with mineral. The spring is immediately under the mill, and Gen. Hampton will have a passage made to it and willhave the water analyzed. It is believed to be chalybeate (Tuckasiege Democrat)

The store proper, will be stocked with Racked goods, so they say, in quality inferior to nothing in W. N. C. Three names are mentioned in connection with this venture—Everett. Ditmore and Cathey, and we hope they will advertise liberally, as therein lies the secred of commercial success.

J. W. L. Arthur returned from his trip to Ohio last week, and says he had great success. He laid a large contract for locust blocks that will necessitate the addition of a saw plant here. He further informs us that the firm of Arthur, Coffin & Co. will enlarge their works much beyond their original intentions and expect eventually to give employment to fifty or seventy five hands here in Bryson City. Mr. Arthur left Tuesday morning for a business trip along the great lakes and the New England coast. His first point will be Erie, Pa., where he will purchase a seventy five horse power engine and have it shipped here immediately. This is one of the things we are glad to lay before our readers. The enterprising firm of Arthur, Coffin & Co., has done as much as any one agency since the R. R. was built to advance the interests of Bryson City and Swain County, and we hope the returns from their venture will be speedy and large. There is room and to spare for a few other wood working establishments, and we hope to see some more located here in the near future.

Judson June 10, 1889 Editor Herald

Dear Sir—My stay in your City over the 3rd and 4th inst. Was one of great pleasure and interest. Two months had passed since my last visit to the little Metropolis. During my former stay I was forcible struck with your rapid progress and deeply impressed with the fact that Bryson City would one day be famons fo enterprise, and industrial pursuits, but I predicted a distant day. But now the fallacy of my predictions is very apparent.

I had no thought of so great improvement and increase of industrial pursuits in two months. No town or village in the range of my knowledge has as bright a future as Bryson City. The click of telegraph, the rattle of the type, the screech of the whistle, the whir of the wheel, the buzz of the saw, the ring of the hammer, the sound of vehicles, the music of the band, and numerous other business marks, only insinuate what Bryson City will be. The writer saw drawings of the brick block being erected by your merchant prince, D. K. Collins. This means and looks like business. Hurrah for Swain yours, rejoicing in its prosperity. (Anonymors)

Swain County - area 550 square miles

Population – 6,000 (white 4,500 colored 200, Indians 1,300)

Swain County was formed in 1871, from Macon and Jackson Counties, and was named in honor of D. L. Swain, formerly Governor of North Carolina and President of the University.

The atmosphere is salubrious and the climate mild.

The Western North Carolina Railroad runs a distance of forty miles, very nearly through the center of the county.

Water-power is abundant, and scenery fine. This county has 250,000 acres of the finest grazing land in the world.

Bryson City – the county seat, romantically situated on both sides of the Tuckaseigee River, about thirteen miles above its junction with the Tennessee, is 325 miles from Raleigh. Population 450.

It was formerly called "Charleston", was changed to Bryson City by an act of Legislature, session 1889, in honor of Col. T. D. Bryson, a citizen of Swain County, and for a long time a member of the Legislature.

Surface-mountainous, and watered by the Tennessee, Tuckaseigee, Nantahala and Ocona Lufty Rivers.

Staples – corn, wheat, oats, rye, buckwheat, tobacco, potatoes, and a variety of vegetables.

Fruits - Apples, peaches, grapes, pears

Timbers – Walnut, Cherry, Oak, Poplar, Pine, Birch, Beech, Ash

Minerals – Gold, silver, lead, copper, marble, talc, kaoline, irons.



Alfred Barker

Born 10-1850 in Macon county, North Carolina He was the son of Brantley Barker and Mary Stillwell Married- Martha Ann Dailey 12-16-1871 in Macon county, North Carolina

Martha Dailey was born 3-1852 in Georgia. She was the daughter of Franklin Dailey and Vina?.

There are several online post for the death date of Alfred Barker. They are 1908, 1911 and 1913. I maintain none of those are correct. I have a corresponding sheet of questions that were ask of a person requesting a marriage license in Swain county, North Carolina. The Register of Deeds/County Clerk ask the name of each parent and if they were living or dead.

Arthur Barker, son of Alfred and Martha Ann Barker applied for a marriage license 2-15-1906. He stated his mother, Martha was alive but his father, Alfred was deceased.

Alfred Nelson Barker, son of Alfred and Martha Ann Barker applied for a marriage license 9-30-1907. He stated both parents were deceased. Another clue is the place of marriage. Laura Bell Barker, daughter of Alfred and Martha Ann Barker married Will Jenkins in January 1904. The marriage was held at the home of Ann Barker (Martha Ann). If Alfred Barker had been alive, the place of marriage would have been at the home of Alfred Barker. In addition, Alfred Barker was a witness to his children's marriages through the end of the late 1800's - until the marriage of his daughter, Laura Bell Barker.

Alfred Barker died between the date of the census 6-6-1900 and the date of his daughter's marriage in January 1904.

Martha Ann Dailey Barker died between 2-15-1906 and 9-30-1907.

Cora Mae Barker- born 5-1873 in Macon county, NC Married - William "Will" Jenkins 12-21-1904 in Swain county, NC Cora was several years older than Will Jenkins They had no children

They raised her niece, Eva/Iva Leona Barker, daughter of her brother Alfred Nelson Barker.

Cora and Will Jenkins were living in Swain county in the 1930 census. She died between 1930-1934 as Will Jenkins married Oma Barker in approximately 1934. Will Jenkins was thirty years older than Oma Barker. A cemetery record indicates Oma Barker was the niece of Cora Barker. I am not sure that is correct. They may be confusing Eva with Oma. Eva Leona Barker married Norman Ensley. Cora Barker only had three brothers- Arthur Winchester, Barker Alfred Nelson Barker and George Napoleon Barker and I find no record of any of them having a daughter named Oma or any variation of that name. Will Jenkins and Oma Barker had three children- Ray - born 1935; Abie (1936-1948) and Bertie Mae born 1940. Will Jenkins died 10-7-1955. Oma Jenkins was living in Waynesville, NC in 1957.

*Note of interest- Will Jenkins did marry Cora's sister, Laura Bell Barker in January 1904. She apparently died within a few months of that marriage as Will obtained a marriage license to marry Cora on 8-25-1904 and they married in December of 1904.



I hope this information will be helpful now and in the future for anyone researching the family descendants of Alfred Barker and Martha Ann Dailey.

There are several reputable sites available online such as ancestry.com and public member trees. I do not copy the information someone else has created on these sites. I look up each person via government public records - notably census records, military records, marriage records and death records. The state of North Carolina kept fabulous records that are so valuable today in tracing family heritage. These are listed in the back as "sources". I do use findagrave.com. I figure if someone has bought a tombstone with an inscription of a name, date of birth and date of death, and I have a physical picture of that tombstone, it should be pretty accurate. I also use public record newspaper obituaries. It is most unfortunate the 1890 census records are missing in national and local records. There are children that were born after 1880-married or died before the next census year of 1900 that get left out of family tree records unless someone is specifically connected to a family that has a family Bible with that information.

Some might say "no, great Pappy Grandpa was not born in 1877, he was born in 1879." Military records are notorious for having the wrong year of birth. The great men of that day scrambled to get into the military to serve their country, therefore, whatever the age criteria for entrance was at that time - well, yes, that just happened to be the year they were born. It will usually resurface in a death certificate as the correct date of birth. Birth certificates or birth records did not begin in North Carolina until 1913. There are some people who just did not know the exact year they were born.

This information took hours, days and months to complete. The information is correct if the public record information is correct. How do I tie in to Alfred Barker's line? I don't. I am a descendant of Brantley Barker, father of Alfred Barker through the line of William Barker, Alfred's brother. I found I had quite a bit of information on Alfred so I decided to complete it.
